



## Human Capital in the Inclusive Wealth Report 2017

This presentation will feature the results from the second in a biennial publication on wealth in 140 countries around the world from 1990-2015. Measuring wealth is important in order to assess a country's progress towards sustainability. In this report, wealth includes produced, human, and natural capital, with the experimental health capital wealth estimates. The overall results will be examined with particular reference to human capital, which were constructed using methodology developed and initially implemented by Arrow, Dasgupta, Goulder, Mumford and Oleson. With the addition of 2015, more recent changes will be highlighted. Employing multiple methodological assessments of health as a measurement of natural capital, we further emphasize the linkages between scientific data and policies and highlight policy implications at local, national, and regional levels.
